HPO Resource Quick Links

- **Domiciliary Care for Homeless Veterans (DCHV) Program** uses modern, advanced medical techniques in a residential setting for 24/7 support that enables Veterans to live independent, fulfilling, and healthy lives.
- <u>Health Care for Homeless Veterans (HCHV) Program</u> offers outreach, exams, treatment, referrals, and case management to homeless Veterans at more than 135 sites where trained, caring VA specialists provide tools and support necessary to get life on a better track.
- **Readjustment Counseling Service's Vet Center Programs** feature communitybased locations and outreach activities that help to identify and match homeless Veterans with necessary services.
- U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development-VA Supportive Housing (HUD-VASH) is a collaborative program between HUD and VA that combines HUD housing vouchers with VA supportive services to help Veterans who are homeless and their families find and sustain permanent housing.
- Enhanced-Use Lease (EUL) Program is a VA portfolio management tool that allows certain land and buildings to be leased to eligible private entities for approved supportive housing and related projects for homeless and at-risk Veterans.
- <u>Supportive Services for Veteran Families</u> (SSVF) provides case management and supportive services to prevent the imminent loss of a Veteran's home or identify a new, more suitable housing situation for the individual and his or her family; or to rapidly re-house Veterans and their families who are homeless and might remain homeless without this assistance.
- As part of funds allocated in the American Rescue Plan, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has <u>announced the first tranche</u> of Emergency Housing Voucher (EHV) <u>awardees, totaling \$1.1 billion</u>. <u>Download list</u> of EHV awardees.

"As of May 31, 2021, **72,554** Veterans currently participating in VHA specialty homeless programs, or who have experienced or were at risk of homelessness in the past 12 months, have received the COVID-19 vaccine.

HPO Fact of the Month

Did you know?

Veterans who were of younger age or who were unmarried at the time of onset of an Alzheimer's disease and related dementias (ADRD) diagnosis were found to be at a greater risk of experiencing homelessness, according to research published in May 2021 (Incidence of Homelessness among Veterans Newly Diagnosed with Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementias). This Alzheimer's & Brain Awareness Month (June), VA is proud to contribute to the important conversation about brain health by highlighting the care for Veterans with Alzheimer's or other forms of dementia throughout the full range of VA health care services and the research that continues to identify places VA can innovate and provide support—including for those at-risk of and experiencing homelessness.
