

THE STATE OF Veteran Homelessness | 2024

Few conditions are more harmful to individual health and welfare than homelessness. That's why the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) is committed to ensuring every Veteran has a safe and stable place to call home.

Partnering with federal, state, and local community organizations across the country, VA provides wraparound services that integrate housing, health care, employment, and education assistance programs to support at-risk Veterans and help those experiencing homelessness become—and remain—stably housed.

We have dedicated unprecedented resources to help solve this problem, but more work needs to be done.

Here's how we are addressing the challenge and how you can help.

2010-2024 Accomplishments

Achieved a more than 55.6% reduction in Veteran homelessness since 2010. 32,882 Veterans are now experiencing homelessness on a given night, down from nearly 74,000 in 2010.¹ 85 communities and 3 states—Connecticut, Delaware, and Virginia—effectively ended Veteran homelessness.

formerly homeless Veterans under lease through the Housing and Urban Development-Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (HUD-VASH) program at the end of the year, the most in the history of the program.
